She had her mind set on Africa but little did she know she was going to take on a whole different adventure. Hernandez hoped to embark on an experience abroad during her undergraduate studies and as her senior year came to an end she managed to accomplish this through an internship. After applying for an internship in Africa and some scholarships that would support her studies abroad she found that there was a more suitable internship elsewhere. Graduating with a focus in Human Development and Family Sciences she learned about an internship with Holt International Children Services in Guatemala. Once applying, she also applied for some scholarships and not only did she land the internship in Guatemala but was also granted the Gilman Scholarship in the amount of \$2,500. About a month later she received some more great news: her scholarship had been increased to \$4,000 and the program would cover her housing expenses during the 6-month period she'll be in Guatemala City and Quetzaltenango. She adds that this experience seems like a better fit for her. Hernandez lastly mentions that Holt is a program that is working toward strengthening the court system that determines the fate of the children in crisis.

"Throughout the prolongation of the internship I'll be assisting in the development and implementation of child management systems. Holt concentrates on family values and working as a sponsorship program that works closely with orphanages. Instead of admitting children into adoption institutions they focus on preserving families together. They want to help these families raise their children by providing education, family and parenting counseling as well as financial resources."

## **AMAS' UPDATES**

We should be fully enjoying the spring weather, but it has barely arrived in this part of the country. But, I am enjoying the "green" (not UO) part of the nature. In this newsletter issue, I would like to highlight some of things that are happening in CAMP and there are in no specific order.

Back in March, we selected the 35 scholars for 2011-12. They come from all over the state. For the first time we are glad to add Chiloquin and Mt. Angel to our list of high schools we serve. My staff and I will be meeting the new scholars, for the first time as a group on July 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> during the University's START Bilingüe. Also, we'll be starting soon with the process in hiring the Outreach Specialist position. My hope is the new staff will be able to joins us sometime in July. We are excited to have the new person on our team.



Last week, we went through a site program performance evaluation. An external evaluator spent two days interviewing some University personnel, CAMP staff and participants as well as reviewing student files for eligibility compliance, internal financial bookkeeping, and information on delivery of services we provide to our students. The preliminary report indicates that we are performing well as a program, but I am very interested to see the final report and its recommendations. As a staff, we'll examine, in more detail, the report this summer and take action on the recommendations. As a program we continue to strive for the best.

We are also getting ready for the Oregon Migrant Student Leadership Institute that will take place the last week of July and the first two weeks in August. The Leadership Institute is the result of our close collaboration with our state Migrant Education Program (MEP) and the 19 regions the MEP is representing in Oregon. We have received most of the applications and close to 180 migrant high school students will be coming to OSU during those three weeks. A staff of 22 individuals will be working directly with the participants. Sixteen of the staff members are CAMP students who are currently enrolled at OSU and some of them are recent graduates.

There are few more weeks left in this academic year. Around this time there is always some excitement as well some sadness. This year, I am excited that since the inception of the grant in 2004, we'll have the largest graduating group, but also sad that most of them we'll be leaving OSU and perhaps some of them we'll never see again. I am very proud of this graduating cohort. They were a unique group. They will be missed greatly.

Lastly, our annual CAMP Recognition Ceremony event is around the corner. On June 4<sup>th</sup>, current students, graduating students, families, OSU faculty and staff and other invitees will celebrate the accomplishment of our students. The keynote speaker at the event is someone who is the product of the HEP and CAMP programs, which makes the event more appropriate. With this celebration, we'll officially bring the academic year to a close. Over the years, we at OSU CAMP continue to make a difference in the lives of our participants and beyond.
